



WHO WE ARE

For over two decades, Arts, etc. has been providing financial support to help increase the availability of arts education for students on Johns and Wadmalaw Islands. Our 200+ members are women living on Kiawah Island and Cassique who volunteer, donate and join together regularly for cultural education. The majority of the schools served by our Program Partner organization from the Charleston arts community are Title 1 schools where the income profile of the district is often inadequate to support arts programming for their deserving students. This type of programming is known to enrich the overall education experience.

The Kiawah Art & House Tour has been our primary annual fund raiser for over a decade. Through the generosity of our business sponsors, ticket buyers, along with member and friend donations, we are able to offer 20+ quality programs annually, to over 2,000 students in the community schools provided by the high quality music and arts organizations in the Charleston area. (We are pausing the Kiawah Art and House Tour for 2025-2026, so that we can celebrate our 25th Anniversary with a Gala in April.)

WHY DOES ARTS PROGRAMMING MATTER TO STUDENTS?

Arts education impacts our students by:

- Enhancing Creativity and Critical Thinking: Engaging in the arts encourages students to think outside the box, fostering creative problem-solving skills. This nurtures their ability to approach challenges in innovative ways, which is essential not only in arts-related fields but in all aspects of life and learning.
- Improves Emotional Expression and Confidence: Arts education provides a platform for students to express themselves in a safe and supportive environment. Whether through theater, music, or visual arts, children can explore and convey their emotions, leading to improved emotional intelligence and self-confidence. This is particularly beneficial for young people who might struggle with traditional forms of expression.
- Supports Academic and Social Development: Studies have shown that students who participate in the arts often perform better in other academic areas. The skills gained from practicing and performing such as discipline, focus, and collaborative work—translate to improved performance in subjects like math and reading, while also enhancing social skills and teamwork.

The widespread poverty on Johns Island limits opportunity for exposure to the arts for so many students. Expanding someone's horizons and perspective and experience is a very powerful tool, and Arts, etc. has been able to do that with music, theater and visual arts in so many ways. Many residents choose to leave Johns Island for high school based on the belief that other area schools have more to offer. Schools are funded on enrollment, so this becomes a spiral - less resources means less "extras" are offered and the cycle (and perception) continues. CCSD also just recently increased teacher pay, which is fantastic for teachers and much deserved, but this has stretched school budgets and forced reallocations in some cases across many schools. When organizations like Arts, etc. provide funding for the "extras" it provides a relief in those budgetary constraints.


FINANCIAL REPORT
